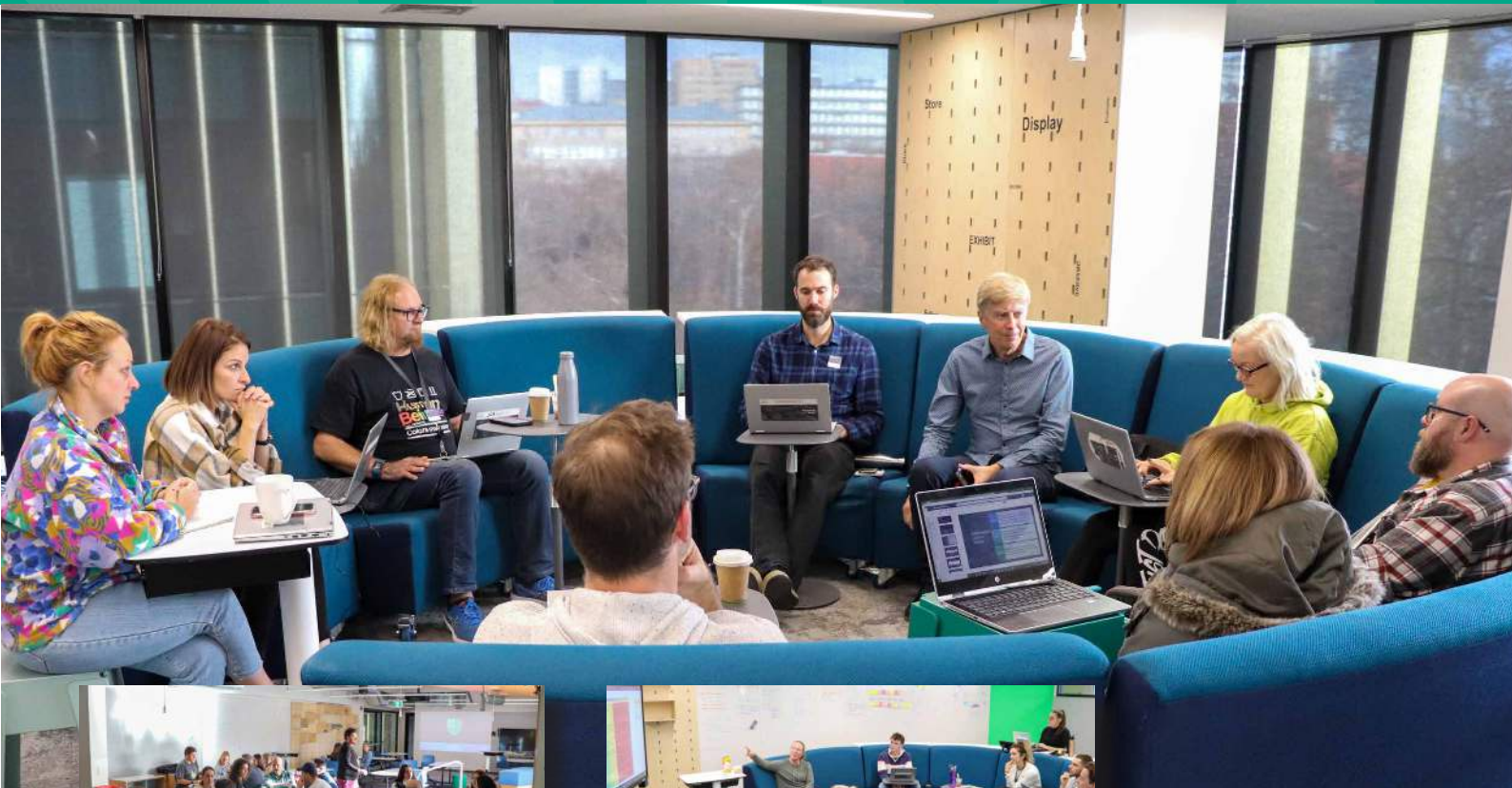

Update from the Principal








Student Free Day – Challenging thinking about how teaching allows space for curiosity, and creating stretch for all our students

Student-free days for educators are valued like gold and last Tuesday was no exception to that. Our professional learning lens for this day was 'allowing space for curiosity and stretch in task design'. Teachers and class support SSOs participated in workshops that delved into the different elements of task design. These workshops included rubric design, developing worked examples for students, student evidence of learning, and feedback checkpoints. Facilitated by experienced teachers and leaders with a passion for these areas, the workshops focused on discussion around building consistency in line with the frameworks from 'Our Charter', challenging thinking about how teaching allows space for curiosity, and creating stretch for all our students.

On Tuesday 11 May the Adelaide Botanic High School AGM was held. It was an opportunity for me to share our successes, challenges and future directions with the community as well as form the 2021 Council. Although 2020 provided many challenges it was heartening to be able to talk about so many incredible achievements and positives, especially regarding student learning and the variety of opportunities they were able to engage in.

Aerosol deodorants and perfumes

We have had several occurrences recently of a severe allergic reaction to the use of deodorant/perfume aerosol at school. This has resulted in emergency medical treatment and life-threatening breathing difficulties. Many of our students and staff have breathing difficulties or allergies and can become very ill when deodorant and perfume is sprayed in their vicinity. For those with acute sensitivities, these products pose a serious health hazard.

Despite clearly communicating the school’s expectations regarding not bringing or using aerosol deodorants at school, we continue to experience them being used.

Students who wish to ‘freshen up’ during the day will need to use a roll-on, gel or pump spray deodorant - aerosol sprays must be left at home.

We are asking all parents to help support the health and safety of students and staff by making sure that aerosols are not purchased for use in school. We will continue to talk with students to help them understand the reasons why this is important and look forward to your support.

This term's focus on punctuality and regular attendance

Teachers proactively teach and model the school's Responsible Behaviour Expectations. So far this year, staff have focused on two of the school's key expectations; speaking appropriately and meeting agreed timelines. This term, the focus is on being punctual and regular in attendance, which aligns with the school's guiding value of "Excellence".

Community

- Be punctual and regular in attendance
- Allow students to learn and teachers to teach
- Be organised and take responsibility for your own learning
 - Meet agreed timelines, by following the submission of work guidelines
 - Participate in and complete all activities and tasks

Attendance matters!

Every day matters in the school life of a young person and every day they are at school is a step along the pathway towards future success. High attendance at school contributes towards positive educational outcomes for students and by attending school, they are able to develop crucial academic and social skills.

For students who are unable to show responsible behaviour by being punctual and regularly attending school, there are tiered consequences, which have been discussed with them during Studio One:

Tier I: Students will be provided with a warning and reminder about the requirement to be in class, on time, and to return to class in a timely manner. Teachers will use the ABHS Restorative Practices Questions to support the conversation about this expectation.

Tier II: Teachers or Leaders will make a parent phone call to alert parents to the fact that their child is currently not attending class as expected, and that they have already received a reminder.

Tier III: When students continue not to learn from their previous lessons regarding being punctual and regular in attendance, our leadership team have endorsed the use of an internal suspension for either a half day or a full day at the discretion of the Student Achievement and Success Leader. It is OK that some students require more one-to-one explicit lessons about the behaviours expected at Adelaide Botanic High School. Spending a day with the leadership team, out of class, enables us to continue to teach and reinforce our school culture with students.

Please note that if students continue to avoid class, and the Tier I, II and III strategies have not resulted in improved attendance and punctuality, the school will proceed with an external suspension. The aim of the suspension is to send a clear message that this repeated behaviour is not acceptable, and that a team approach involving the student, leadership team and family is required to support a behaviour change.

These strategies are in alignment with the Department for Education's Positive Behaviour Support PBS approach in their Behaviour Support Policy. We ask that parents support our whole school approach by reinforcing the importance of being punctual and regular in attendance by having conversations at home.

Make school attendance a priority

- ✓ Talk about the importance of coming to school every day.
- ✓ Develop daily routines including completing plus time getting a good night's sleep.
- ✓ Schedule appointments after school.
- ✓ Ensure your child comes to school everyday unless they are truly sick.

Communicate with the school

- ✓ Support the school's expectations that students should be punctual and regular in attendance.
- ✓ Talk to teachers if you notice sudden changes in behaviour. These could be related to something happening at school.
- ✓ Respond to SMS requests asking for an explanation for your child's absence.



SANTOS Aboriginal Power Cup

Involvement in the Power Cup contributes towards the students' SACE.

During the carnival on Thursday and Friday both teams came second overall, only losing one game each to the winning teams.

The whole event culminated in a game at Adelaide Oval prior to the Port Adelaide game on Sunday, with both our students' teams (girls and boys) winning the overall SANTOS Aboriginal Power Cup. This is an amazing achievement!

The North-East South Australian Aboriginal Sports Training (SAASTA) Academy, which Kya and Jamie are part of, also won the Curriculum Excellence Award. This is a fantastic reflection of the quality work which our students have produced this semester.

Uniting a Country Through Cultural Understanding

Did you know that the Australian Aboriginal people are the oldest continuous living culture in the world? Or that some of the most ancient lands in the world are in Australia?

Some of the Year 8 and 9 Global Perspectives classes had the privilege of meeting Adnyamathanha tribal Elder, Mr Clifford Coulthard, from South Australia's northern arid lands, and hearing his stories, experiences and facts about the land and culture. The Adnyamathanha (meaning 'Rock People') are from the Flinders Ranges region.

In addition to working with archaeologists and educational institutions around the globe, Mr Coulthard divides his time between conducting tours and educating the community about Aboriginal culture and the land at Iga Warta (near Leigh Creek) and Wadna, at Blinman, South Australia.

The Adelaide Botanic High School community sincerely thanks Mr Coulthard for this enriching opportunity, along with his cultural assistant, Mike Dent, who supports indigenous cultures and communities in Australia and Fiji.

The rich understandings and insights gained from this unique opportunity coincided with National Reconciliation Week and enhanced students' understanding of their Shapes 'n' Scapes/Landforms and Landscapes, History and Tourism units, which is clearly evident from the student feedback on the following page.

Mr Coulthard impressed upon the students that learning is a lifelong journey and permeates the boundaries of the classroom; to step out and spend time with different peoples on their land fosters authentic connections and therefore a deeper understanding and respect for history and country. Each and every one of us can make a positive difference.

Self-service metroCARD kiosk

Students can now recharge their metroCARDs using the school's new self-service kiosk which is located on Level 1 opposite the Student Services desk.

Please note that the machine only accepts EFTPOS/credit cards with PINs. Payment cannot be made using a mobile phone.



Extending laptop usage time

Power banks are now available to purchase via Qkr! for \$132. Power banks can be charged at home and brought to school each day along with the laptop for extra power.

The new HP power adapter (supplied with laptops purchased in 2021) charges a power bank significantly faster than older HP power adapters*. Therefore, for students who purchased laptops prior to 2021, it is beneficial to purchase the new power adapter with the power bank for optimal performance. The power adapter is available for pre-order via Qkr! for \$42 for expected delivery early July.

Once paid for via Qkr!, send your child to collect their power bank and/or power adapter (when available) from Student Services.

*As a guide, the older model HP power adapter requires approximately 12+ hours to completely charge a power bank compared to approximately four hours for the new HP power adapter.

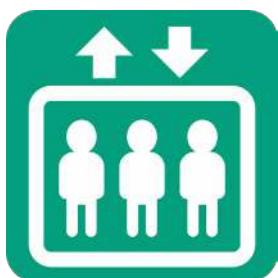
Year 10 Outdoor Education
